Do we really need another Shakespeare production? And can old—often problematic—stories be retold in new ways? These are the questions I've been wrestling with this year. While *Much Ado About Nothing* gives us some of Shakespeare's most memorable characters—Dogberry! Beatrice! Benedick!—it also gives us a deeply misogynistic plotline. And, as in most classical comedies, all is resolved through heteronormative marriage.

In queering Much Ado, I wanted to see myself and my students reflected in the play and to discover what of Shakespeare's text could be preserved, reclaimed, or ultimately discarded. Shakespeare's Much Ado begins with soldiers returning from war, and, in our production, they are angel defenders returning from the queer frontlines, where they have been counter-protesting anti-LGBTQ+ rhetoric.

The first time LGBTQ+ counter-protestors dressed as angels was at the trial of Matthew Shepard's murderers in 1999. The Westboro Baptist Church showed up to spew anti-LGBTQ hate speech, but Matthew's friends were ready. Led by Romaine Patterson, they donned white robes and wings and blocked out the hate with their Angel Action. Since then, angel defenders have been memorialized in *The Laramie Project* and have shown up wherever they are needed from LGBTQ+ funerals to drag story hours.

Angels not only defend LGBTQ+ rights but also create spaces where queer joy and celebration are possible. Many people have worked to create such a space in this show. The talented Will Morris designed the costumes and make-up, while Katrina Miller, who joined our Theater department staff this year, brought the stage to life with her set design. Most exciting of all, student designers, under the mentorship of Assistant Professor Jake Salgado and Visiting Assistant Professor Melissa Livingston, played a crucial role in this production, with Lily Groff as the lighting designer, Calum McConnell as the sound designer, Laura Coffey as the choreographer and hair designer, Emma Li as the assistant costume designer, and Aven Lancaster as the assistant scenic designer. Of course, none of our work would be possible without our dedicated technical director/production manager Alex Owens and our stage manager Kate Stadter.

### **Professor Jake Salgado**

Illustration is the act of using applied skills in composition to translate concepts into aesthetic communication. Fundamental techniques in illustration, such as drawing, painting, sculpture, etc. are deeply rooted in classical artistic tradition, and have seen centuries of evolution throughout the development of their application. Today, this evolution has progressed rapidly from the physical world into the digital one. This development has generated a diverse array of platforms that provide an artist with a wealth of new tools, through which skills in composition may be applied. This course will engage with some of the most commonly used platforms in digital design and explore their applications to composition generation in theatrical settings and beyond.

Arts management exists at the intersection of business and the arts. In this course, students will examine the structure of arts organizations and the people who staff them and will explore how arts organizations fit within the broader cultural, political, and economic world. Students will learn how arts administrators create programming, engage audiences, and support artists throughout the creative process in an industry that contributes billions to the economy.

Class projects will include rehearsals of performance projects both inside and outside of class, attendance at a variety of performances and research and analytical papers and presentations.
